
Color Mixing for Pet/Portrait skin colors

You will mix the portrait skin colors, as we will be using them for shadows and highlights on your pet. It will be easiest when mixing colors to mix in the following order:

Dirty White Mix is used a lot for the whites of the eyes and teeth and other highlights on dark areas.

Some basic fur colors and their shadows and highlights are:



White/LtGrey: Paynes Grey/Burnt	Black: Paynes Grey (darken with	RedBrown: Burnt Sienna

Basic Eve Colors:.

- **Blue:** GreenBlack/Ultramarine Blue/Highlight (add Dark Shadow to gray it down) Shadow & rim of eye: Paynes Grey/Burnt Umber Gleam: Highlight
- Black: Paynes Grey, Gleam & Shine: Highlight, Highlight: Dirty White
- Yellow: Yellow Ochre Shadow at top and edges with Light Shadow. Gleam: Highlight
- Brown: Burnt Umber, Shine: Cad. Orange, Gleam: Highlight
- Lt. GreenGray: Paynes Grey/Highlight/Yellow Ochre, Gleam & H/L: Highlight, Paynes Grey/Burnt Umber around rim.
- Pale Green: Yellow Ochre/Paynes Grey/Highlight, Gleam: Highlight/Paynes Grey

Noses: Look at the color of your pets nose. It isn't smooth, it is textured. Nostrils are not round, watch the shape. Look for the lights and darks on the nose. The nostrils can be Burnt Umber or Paynes Grey or a mix of both.

- Brown nose: Skintone/Light Shadow, darkened with Light Shadow. Highlight: Highlight
- Dark Black nose: Paynes Grey/Burnt Umber/Highlight
- Grey nose: Dark Shadow, Highlight: Skintone, Shadow: Dark Shadow/Burnt Umber
- **Pink Nose:** Blush/Skintone. Put some soft shadows and paint the nostrils in Paynes Grev.
- Red Nose: Blush/Burnt Sienna, Highlight: Highlight, Shadow: Dark Shadow

Tongue, Teeth, Ears: Basecoat the Tongue with Blush/Skintone, Darken with Dark Shadow further back in mouth. Gums can be painted this color. Darken inside with Burnt Umber/Diox.Purple. **Remember, teeth are not white** Basecoat the Teeth with a mixture of Highlight, Paynes Grey and Burnt Umber. Put a "shine" on the teeth with Highlight on any of the teeth that shine in your photo. Look at your photo and add dark shadows or a bright shine to any areas inside the mouth. ****If inside of ears are pink, basecoat with Blush/Skintone. If flesh color: Raw Sienna/Burnt Sienna/Skintone/Light Shadow. Darker ears: Skintone/DeepFlesh.

Here are some examples of background colors:

Blue: Burnt Umber and Pthalo Blue and Highlight. Darken with Paynes Gray. Lighten with Highlight. To darken even further in areas, add some Light Shadow or Burnt Sienna.

Green: Green/Black and Burnt Umber. Darken with Dioxazine Purple and Burnt Umber. Lighten with Skintone.

Red: Alizarin Crimson and Burnt Umber. Darken with Paynes Grey. Lighten with Highlight.

Purple: Dioxazine Purple and Burnt Umber. Darken with Paynes Grey. Lighten with Skintone.

Reddish Earthtone: Raw Sienna, Burnt Sienna, Burnt Umber and a touch of Naples Yellow.

Black: 1st Coat. Burnt Umber & Dioxazine Purple. Let dry overnight. 2nd coat, light glazing of same color. Dirty Brush and Cadmium Orange for "lights" on either side of face. (This background takes longer to paint & dry).

Gold Tones: Yellow Ochre, Raw Sienna, Burnt Sienna. Darken with Burnt Umber.

Gold Tones, darker: Burnt Sienna, Burnt Umber, Yellow Ochre. Darken with Pthalo Blue.

Usually if you want a portrait to really stand out, or anything in a painting, using a contrasting color will do the trick. For instance, if you are dealing with warmer orange skin tones, use the color wheel and go across to its compliment which would be blue. Use a version of blues in the background and pick up some of those blues in the face shadows. For a pinker or rosier skin tones, use a muted green shades in the background and in shadow areas of skin as green is the compliment to rosier shades. With a subject with blue eyes, a green background with a few muted blues works to bring in the eye color throughout. Portraits often benefit from a combination of colors as long as they are muted.
